Going to Pieces: Capitol City Quilt Guild's 2013 Quilt Show Planning Committee Update

Before we know it, the volunteer sign-up sheets will be at our meetings, you will be turning in your quilt registration forms, and more and more items will be accumulated for the boutique and silent auction. It is now August and the show is only nine months away. I know that seems like quite a while, but in retrospect it has already been 15 months since our last show.

Every year your show committee emphasizes the importance of every member of the guild volunteering. It is YOUR show and you make it a success or a flop. This concept of volunteering is going to be pushed a little bit more into the forefront of your thinking, as right on the registration form you are going to be asked "in what capacity are you volunteering". There are many other guilds that REQUIRE a 2 hour work shift for EVERY quilt you enter. We are NOT getting hard nosed like that with you, but we are asking HOW you will volunteer. The committee will explain the various volunteering opportunities/jobs you can do, of which there are many that are not physically challenging, for those of us with health issues. It is very discouraging that only a fraction of our full membership and only a percentage of those who enter quilts actually help to put on the show. Please begin to think of how you are going to contribute to your show.

We are happy to announce that the "Quilts to Go" booth has a chairperson, Fran Mort. Therefore, this booth is a "go", so please begin to think of those quilts you would like to sell.

There was much discussion at our last committee meeting regarding the Boutique and 'garage sale' type items. The committee is excited to have the boutique be full of handmade items for sale. But, we would also like to have a garage sale booth where all proceeds would go to the guild. You will be asked to donate your excess books, magazines, orphan blocks, tools, thread, embellishments, gadgets, etc. that another quilter might enjoy. NO fabric, other than bags of scraps, would be allowed to be sold in the garage sale booth at the show, as we will not go into competition with our vendors, who are very important to a successful show. Most importantly, we need a volunteer, either an individual or a small group, to undertake this task. Please contact me, Linda Wells, <u>clwells78@gmail.com</u>, if you are interested. This would be a nice boost to your guild's bottom line of workable funds.

Our facility for the quilt show, the Best Western Plus, is MUCH smaller than the Summit. We have gotten used to having almost unlimited space, but now we must rein ourselves in. Therefore, we are going to have to limit the number of total quilts in the show, and the number of quilts each member may submit. Three quilts maximum from each member will be accepted up until 400 quilts have been submitted by March 1st. At the March guild meeting we will announce if there is any room for additional quilts and will then accept additional quilts as a group from small groups only with a deadline of April 1. We would want these small group registrations submitted as a group, stapled together. Because of these limiting factors, you will have to make some decisions regarding which quilts you really want to show. Small groups are encouraged to pick and choose special projects as each quilt your group members submits will work towards their three-quilt limit.

Thank you for your help and support! The next quilt show meeting will be on Thursday, September 27, at Kay Nickols' home. Please do not hesitate to contact ANY of your quilt show committee members with questions or comments, and if you want to help!

CCQG Small Groups Open to New Members

Joining or forming a small group is one of the best ways to meet good quilting friends and feel "involved" in YOUR quilt guild! If you have an idea for a group, and need help getting it started, please contact Helen Harrison, small group coordinator. Helen will also have a sign-up sheet at the VP's table for those interested in getting involved in a small group.

Most established small groups have closed memberships because of meeting space restraints and the ongoing projects that they are doing. However, the following is a list of open groups and some additional information about each one. Please use your membership directory for contact information. (Note: this list was up-to-date as of fall, 2011).

Evening Applique Group - meets first Monday of the month, 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., at members' homes. Work on own projects. New members would need to know some of the basics of appliqué, though we are very open to sharing ideas/methods. Contact Ellen Mills.

DAGGERS - (Daytime Applique Group Generating Encouragement, Raves and Support) - meets the 1st Tuesday of every month, 9:30 a.m. to noon, at Rosemary Nester's home in DeWitt. Work on own hand applique projects or other hand work, share ideas and information and Show and Tell. Contact Rosemary Nester.

Foster Friday - meets every Friday at Foster Community center from noon to 4:00 p.m., unless the center is closed due to snow or a holiday. Work on own projects, either hand work or people can bring machines. Contact Gayle Cain.

Lady Fingers - Meets the 2nd Monday of every month at Custom Quilts Shop in Haslett from 10:00 a.m. to noon. Work on own projects, usually hand work. Contact Susan Merkle.

Lunch Bunch - Meets on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of each month at Foster Community Center from 10:30 a.m. - 2:00 p.m., bring lunch, have Show and Tell, work on own projects but sometimes does group activities. Contact Dorothy Jones.

Pedal Pushers - meets the 2nd Friday of the month during warm weather, April - October, at 10:00 a.m. Meet at a convenient parking spot, bring bikes and ride to area quilt shops. 



"During my shop hop today I stopped at Beyond the Thimble in Seatauket and they were so kind to give me Quilter's Tranquilizer--a bag of M&M candy with a note attached. The note read:

Yellow: Soothes nerves when you want to buy fabric and the shop is closed

Red: Reduces irritation when you cannot find just the right fabric. Blue: Reduces frustration when your stash is looking a little low. Brown: Relieves panic attacks when there is no place to hide more fabric.

Orange: Minimizes depression when you cannot get enough time to sew.

Green: Cures the urge to clean house when you could be sewing. Warning: May contribute to weight gain."

Country Stitches

October TINY TREATS Fall Blooms 9" finished /91/2" unfinished



This is a fun and easy block!! Use fall colors, light for background, an accent color for corner triangles; light, medium and dark for Yo Yo flowers, green 1/4" rick rack for stems and green embroidery floss for leaves and one button.

Background: $1 - 9 \frac{1}{2}$ square Accent color: $4 - 2 \frac{1}{2}$ squares--- on wrong side of fabric draw a diagonal line on each one Yo Yo flowers: 1 - 5"circle (medium) 1 - 4" circle (dark) $1 - 3 \frac{1}{2}$ "circle (light)


On 9 1/2" square, place a 2 1/2" square on each corner (right sides together) and sew on diagonal line. Trim 1/4" away from seam and press corners to show triangles. Cut rick rack for stems and arrange on top of 9 1/2" square (as shown in picture). Stitch through center of rick rack. Using green embroidery floss, embroider leaves using stem stitch (or use your sewing machine to make leaves). See placement on picture.

On yo yo circles fold down and sew a running stitch around edge and pull tight to form gathers. All yo yo's will be used with gathered sides up. Place the light 3 1/2" yo yo on top of medium 5" yo yo and attach on stem (as shown in picture) Place the medium 4" yo yo on other stem and attach with button in middle.

You are done! Of course you can change the combination of light, medium and dark for your flower yo yo's. Can't wait to see your blocks.

Tiny Treats block patterns are provided by Wilma Rhodes and Ellen Mills.

November TINY TREATS Amaryllis Bulb 10" finished /10½" unfinished




Cut from light background: - 4 - 2 7/8" squares - draw a diagonal line on 3 squares. - 3 - 2 1/2" squares Cut from flower color: - 3 - 2 7/8" squares - 5 - 2 1/2" squares Cut from lighter green: - 4 - 27/8" squares - draw a diagonal line on 3 squares - 2 - 2 1/2" squares Cut from darker green: - 3 - 2 7/8" squares - 1 - 2 1/2" square Place right sides together in the following order: 2 background squares (with diagonal line) to 2 flower color squares 1 background square (with diagonal line) to 1 light green square 1 background square (with diagonal line) to 1 dark green square 1 light green square (with diagonal line) to 1 flower color square 2 light green squares (with diagonal line) to 2 flower color squares 2 light green squares (with diagonal line) to 2 dark green squares Sew 1/4" on each side of the diagonal line. Cut on the line. Lay out the block - note the direction the triangles are slanted. Sew by rows. Sew the rows together.
